Course overview/description:

This course offers an introduction to contract law, theory and practice. The course will focus on contract formation and grounds for enforcing contracts. We will explore the legal arguments made (or can be made) by each side of the dispute, the legal reasoning behind court rulings, and the purposes/policy goals the various legal rules are designed to serve.

Learning outcomes: By the end of the course, students will understand and be able to apply:

- Consideration doctrine and various bases for enforcing promises.
- Offer and acceptance, and contract formation in general, under the common law and Article 2 of the UCC.
- Doctrines designed for courts to police the bargain.

Basis of evaluation & assessments:

- Grading will be based on the final exam. The exam will be open book and will likely consist of a series of essay questions based on the material covered in class. I reserve the right to adjust your grade down for lack of reading preparation.

Instructor expectations: Students are expected to arrive to each class prepared to discuss the assigned material, including the relevant UCC and Restatement (Second) provisions.

Course rules/structure: I will call on several students each class. On the evening before class, I will post on TWEN the names of students who are expected to be called on the next day. Please note, however, that I expect *everyone* to be prepared for each class.

Feedback: I welcome constructive feedback via email at any time.

Attendance: This course adheres to the law school's attendance policy. Regular and punctual attendance are required to earn academic credit.
