COURSE OVERVIEW/DESCRIPTION:

Contracts are promises "for the breach of which the law gives a remedy, or the performance of which the law in some way recognizes as a duty." What does this definition mean? What do parties have to do to turn a promise into a contract? And do and should courts enforce all such promises? Contracts I examines these essential questions of contract formation. Throughout our courses, differences between the common law and UCC approaches will be highlighted, with occasional comparison to contract law in foreign jurisdictions.

LEARNING OUTCOMES:

- Recognize the primary sources of US contract law, especially the differences between the common law and the UCC
- Understand the process of offer and acceptance in contract formation
- Master the doctrine of consideration, promissory estoppel, and definiteness
- Apply doctrines that police the process of contract formation
- Appreciate the theories and policies governing contract law

Grading will be based on a final exam. Exam format will consist of multiple-choice and essay questions.
