Syllabus "Legal Writing for Law Clerks" Professor Robert Luther III Fall 2024

Course Description and Learning Outcomes: Students enrolled in this course will learn to think like a judicial law clerk. Students will accomplish this goal by taking a critical look at pleadings, briefs, and judicial opinions filed within the last few years through the eyes of a neutral but engaged observer whose responsibility is to assist a Judge. Students will also be required to draft a bench memo, deliver an oral presentation on that bench memo, and draft a final judicial opinion from their bench memo. Students will be provided with briefing on both sides of an undecided case pending in the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Ninth Circuit. By September 28, 2024, students must turn in a bench memo for that case. From October 1-3, 2024, in lieu of group class, students will individually discuss their bench memo with me in 30 minute blocks as if they are conferencing with their Judge prior to the oral argument. Students will then watch/listen to that oral argument in real time when it is argued on October 8, 2024. A final judicial opinion drawn from the bench memo is due on October 15, 2024.

Grading: This course will be letter graded (i.e., on an A+* to F scale). Students will have the opportunity to earn up to 100 points and grades will be determined by the scores earned on the following assignments: bench memo (25 points); oral presentation of bench memo (20 points); final judicial opinion (45 points); and class participation (10 points).
