Introduction:

The course will focus on the practical aspects of appearing before the Federal Circuit. It will discuss the history of the Federal Circuit, the purpose of its creation, its jurisdiction, and rules of practice. It will include brief writing and oral argument. In addition, the course will discuss the practical inner-workings of the Federal Circuit.

Course Materials:

We will not use a casebook for this course. We will use materials collected by us on the various topics that we will cover as well as the current version of the Federal Circuit's Rules of Practice, available at the court's website, www.cafc.uscourts.gov. We will provide a pdf of the materials to each student during the first class.

Class Schedule:

All classes (except for one) will meet at the Law School from 4:00 to 6:00 PM on Wednesdays. One class will be held at the Federal Circuit (as noted below). **Please note that there will be no class on September 4 or October 16**. In addition, we may have conflicts that may require us to cancel a class. We will always warn in advance and will get a substitute, if possible. Office hours will be by appointment.

Learning Outcomes:

By the end of the course, students should be able to demonstrate an understanding of:

- the Federal Circuit rules;
- how to select issues and brief an appeal before the Federal Circuit; and
- how to argue an appeal before the Federal Circuit.

Class Attendance:

The Law School's regulations require regular and punctual attendance. As such, we will take attendance every class and will expect regular attendance. Obviously, there may be instances when you will have to miss class. We ask that you inform one of us in advance that you will be missing a class (to the extent you know).

Grade:

Your writing ability will be judged by the briefs you submit (we will discuss this more during class); your oral skills will be judged through the oral argument, as well as class participation. Specifically, the grade will be broken down as follows:

Briefs: 70%; Oral Argument: 20%; Class Participation: 10%
