COURSE OVERVIEW

This course provides a survey of the US juvenile justice system. Juvenile justice refers to the state's treatment of minors who are accused of criminal activity or violating other social norms. We will discuss the system's historical development, its evolving goals and policy, and related reform efforts. In examining the system, the course will contain elements of criminal law and procedure, education law, mental health law, and family law, among other areas.

At the end of the course, students should be able to:

- Identify the major eras of juvenile justice
- Understand and apply the various substantive legal principles relevant to juvenile justice
- Respond to and provide your own informed critiques of juvenile justice law and policy
