Course Overview

The Military Law course will introduce students to the military justice system in the United States. The domain of “military justice” is a criminal legal system. Sources of military law include the Constitution, the Uniform Code of Military Justice (“UCMJ”), the Rules for Courts-Martial (“RCM”), and the Military Rules of Evidence (“MRE”), among others. This course will provide both an overview of the military justice system’s legal framework and an overview of the system from start to end. It will also cover topics including court-martial jurisdiction, the role of commanders, alternatives to criminal trials, constitutional rights of the accused, pretrial issues, the trial phase of courts-martial, sentencing, appellate review, and substantive military crimes.

Course Learning Outcomes

1. Identify the sources of military law.
2. Understand the alternatives to criminal prosecution in the military justice system.
3. Understand the constitutional rights of a criminal defendant (an "accused") in the military justice system and how they may differ from the rights of criminal defendants within the federal and state criminal justice systems.
4. Understand how court-martial procedures differ from federal criminal trials.

Grading Policies

Exams:

There will be two written take-home exams over the course of the semester. The first will be a midterm exam making up 50% of students' grades. Students will be provided the midterm exam question(s) at the end of a class near the mid-point of the semester (likely week 7). Students will have until the beginning of class on the following week to submit their responses to the instructor.

Similarly, students will be provided the final exam question(s) at the end of the last class of the semester. The final exam will be worth 50% of students' grades. Students will have approximately one week to submit their responses to the instructor. The exam due dates will be made clear as the semester progresses. The exams are "open note," meaning students may refer to any written resources in completing their exams. However, the exams are individual effort, meaning students may not work with any other person while completing them.

Classroom Policies

Attendance:

Per AR 3-1.4, "maintenance of matriculation requires regular class preparation, participation and attendance, registration in the course of study required for the student's program (full-time or part-time), successive registration for each fall and spring term of each academic year until study is completed, and compliance with all other relevant requirements."

Absences:

Per AR 4-1.1, "if a student is absent for any reason for more than 20 percent of the sessions of a course, the student is not eligible for credit in that course. A student who is not present for at least 75 percent of a session of the course is absent from that session."

Participation & Preparation:

Students are expected to attend each class prepared with the reading assignments completed beforehand. Under the Antonin Scalia Law School at George Mason University Academic Regulations for Juris Doctor Students (adopted August 15, 2024) (the "Academic Regulations"), instructors have the discretion to make a single upward or downward adjustment to students' grades (e.g., from B to B+ or from A- to B+) based on their class participation throughout the course.

Use of Technology & AI:

Strict Use Policy: The use of generative AI tools is not permitted for any coursework in this course. Unauthorized use will be treated as a violation of academic standards.

Electronic Devices:

Students are free to take notes via whatever method works best for them. However, students should refrain from using cell phones during class. If a student needs to use their phone during class time, please feel free to step outside the room.

Recording/Livestreaming of Class:

Under the Academic Regulations, students may not record or livestream any part of class.
