Legal Fundamentals is a specialized course designed to give an early opportunity to develop and practice essential bar exam skills and strategies by focusing on developing critical lawyering and exam-taking skills needed for success. Specifically, you will receive instruction in reading comprehension, issue identification, rule mastery, critical thinking (including spotting misleading answer choices), and legal analysis – all practiced in the context of bar exam–style problems. Throughout the semester, we will review substantive law topics and highly-tested doctrines, practice multiple-choice questions (MBE) and essay writing (MEE), and become familiar with the Multistate Performance Test (MPT) format. The goal is to enhance both your knowledge of frequently tested material and your ability to apply that knowledge strategically under exam conditions.

Course Objectives

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Demonstrate mastery of bar exam skills including reading comprehension, rapid issue identification, rule recall, critical thinking, and legal analysis in the context of MBE, MEE, and MPT-style questions.
- Apply a systematic problem-solving method to multiple-choice, essay, and performance test questions under time constraints.
- Recognize and analyze highly tested doctrines and apply them strategically in bar exam–style problems.
- Develop and refine exam-taking strategies for multiple-choice and essay questions, including effective use of the IRAC method.
- Interpret and respond to Multistate Performance Test (MPT) tasks by reading, synthesizing, and applying facts and law to produce effective work product.
- Implement effective bar preparation habits including time management, memorization strategies, stress management, and study planning.
- Self-assess strengths and areas for improvement using performance feedback from quizzes, essays, midterm, and final exam.
- Engage in professional conduct and communication consistent with law school and bar admission expectations, including preparedness, participation, and adherence to deadlines.

Course Delivery

This class combines weekly in-person sessions with online learning modules through BARBRI. Course content is organized into modules by subject. We will utilize BARBRI's online platform (Desire2Learn, or D2L) for assignments and course materials. Each week will generally operate as follows:

- **Pre-Class:** Complete the assigned BARBRI online modules (e.g. video lectures, readings, and practice questions) on the D2L platform. These modules deepen your understanding of the rules and concepts for that week's subject. (Prior to the first class, you will also complete an MBE diagnostic pre-test to gauge your baseline knowledge.)
- **In-Class:** Attend the class sessions to work through practice questions and guided exercises. Class time will be devoted to applying a systematic problem-solving approach to bar exam questions – including MBE multiple-choice questions, essay hypotheticals, and occasionally MPT-style tasks – with instructor guidance and discussion.
- **Post-Class:** After each class, complete reinforcement exercises and additional practice assignments on the BARBRI D2L platform. These assignments solidify your grasp of the material and skills covered.

Course Site

This module-based approach of pre-class study, in-class practice, and post-class review is designed to provide iterative learning and feedback. All online assignments and course content will be accessible via the BARBRI D2L course site. You will receive an e-mail with log-in information to access the classroom prior to the first day of class. If you did not receive an e-mail, please contact your instructor. You can also reach out to support at support@lawstudentonline.com for technical questions. Important course announcements and additional materials, if any, will be posted on Canvas, so please check Canvas and your email regularly for updates or communication from the instructor.

Attendance Requirements

Regular attendance is mandatory in accordance with law school policy and Academic Regulations. If you are absent for any reason for more than 20% of the class sessions (which is 2 out of 13 meetings for this course), you are not eligible for credit. If you must miss a 3rd or 4th class (up to ~30% of sessions), you must seek approval by communicating with your instructor in writing and completing substitute work approved by the instructor to make up for those additional absences. Substituted work is solely at the instructor's discretion, and no instructor is compelled to permit it. **More than 4 absences, at the above-described conditions, will violate the attendance requirements and will result in a grade of NC for the course.**

Please plan to attend every session and arrive on time. If an emergency or illness will cause you to miss class, notify the instructor as soon as possible to discuss make-up assignments. Your attendance and active participation are critical to your success in this course and on the bar exam.

Evaluation

Grading Basis: This course is graded Credit (CR)/No Credit (NC). There is no curve or letter grade; you will receive a grade of "CR" (Credit) if you meet the course requirements, or "NC" (No Credit) if you do not. CR indicates work equivalent to a C or better on the A+* through F scale. The grade of NC indicates work that falls below the equivalent of a C on the A+* through F scale and does not qualify for credit towards the Juris Doctor degree. Unlike traditional law school courses, and very much like the bar exam, assignments are not graded on

a curve. Your success in the course is dependent on the effort you put in and not based how you measure with your peers. Unless otherwise noted, all assignments must be completed on an individual basis. It will be a breach of the school's Academic Standards if students collaborate or work on these assignments together. Percentages below indicate how each element contributes to your overall course evaluation:

- **Pre-Test and Lecture Completion (10%):**

- Timely completion of the **Diagnostic Pre-Test** on the BARBRI D2L platform (administered by BARBRI prior to the first class) and timely completion of any assigned **BARBRI lectures**, including watching the full lectures and completing embedded quizzes.
 - Each Lecture, including Skill Reinforcement Lectures, is scored. Your overall "Lecture Score" will be the average of all individual lecture scores. The score on each lecture is based on the number of correctly answered questions embedded in the lecture. However, you are allowed unlimited attempts to re-answer missed questions and bring every lecture score to 100%. The highest score achieved on each lecture will be factored into your overall "Lecture Score."
- You may retake a lecture to improve the score at any point during the course (i.e., you may improve a lecture score after the deadline has passed for that lecture). After the final exam window has closed, any incomplete lectures will be scored as a zero when calculating your overall "Lecture Score." You will know you've completed a lecture once you reach the final "Congratulations!" screen. Your score on the lecture will be provided on this screen as well. If you would like to improve your lecture score to 100%, click on "Retake Missed Questions" and you will have the opportunity to re-answer any questions you initially answered incorrectly. Your highest score will be counted, so it is to your benefit to correctly re-answer missed questions and bring each lecture score to 100%.

- **Quizzes, Essays and MPTs (25%):**

- Completion of three (3) **In-Class Quizzes** on the BARBRI D2L platform. These quizzes are timed, open-book, and will be **scored** immediately upon submission.
 - If you are absent for any of the three (3) scheduled In-Class Quiz dates (see Assignment Schedule below), you are required to complete the missed Quiz by the same deadline as the weekly assignment for the following class. Late assignments will receive a score of 0.
 - *For example: If you miss the In-Class Contracts Retention Building Quiz on September 16 (Class 4), you must complete the Quiz by 11:59 p.m. on September 22, which is the weekly assignment deadline for Class 5. If you complete a Quiz outside of class due to an absence, the Quiz will still be open-book, and you are strongly encouraged to time yourself to 30 minutes for completion.*
- Timely completion of any assigned BARBRI **Essays** and **Performance Tasks** via D2L. Four (4) Essays total will be **scored**. You are expected to submit all work by the established deadlines and complete each week's assignments as outlined on BARBRI platform:
 - All assignments are tracked and reported to the instructor. If you miss any work for the week, you will receive an automatic email on the day following the deadline. You will then have a 24-hour grace period to submit the missing assignments.
 - If the work is still not submitted within the 24-hour grace period, you will have up to three (3) additional opportunities, each with its own 24-hour grace period, to complete the assignment.
 - In total, you will have up to three (3) opportunities to submit a late assignment. Late assignments submitted after these three (3) opportunities will receive a score of 0.

- **Midterm Exam (25%)** – A closed-book and timed mid-semester assessment administered by the Records Office. It will include multiple-choice questions and essay questions.

- **Final Exam (30%)** – A closed-book and timed final assessment administered by the Records Office. This exam will include multiple-choice questions and essay questions. It is designed to assess your mastery of the skills and subjects covered throughout the course.

- **Individual Counseling Session (5%)** – Mandatory participation in a scheduled one-on-one bar advising session over the two-week period of October 19 through 30, to review your performance in the course, in the mid-term, and determine a plan for addressing any areas of growth. You must attend your session and complete any assigned self-assessment forms.
- **Attendance and Class Participation (5%)** – Regular attendance (see Attendance Requirements above) and meaningful in-class engagement are expected. Each class builds on concepts from earlier classes, so it is important to prepare for, and attend, each class.

Final Determination: To receive a grade of “CR” for this course, students must meet the Attendance Requirements described above and:

1. Achieve an overall weighted score of at least **70%**, and
2. Complete both the Midterm Exam and Final Exam. Academic Regulation 4-5 (Examinations) apply to both exams.

Any assignments not completed, or submitted past the deadlines indicated above, will receive a score of 0 and will count toward the overall weighted score, potentially jeopardizing your ability to reach the 70% weighted score threshold for “CR”.

Note: I reserve the right to alter course content and/or adjust the pace to accommodate class progress. Students are responsible for keeping up with all adjustments to the course calendar.

Course Policy on Use of Generative Artificial Intelligence (AI)

All work submitted in this course, including assignments and exams, must be your own original work; use of AI writing tools, such as ChatGPT, are prohibited in this course and will be considered a violation of academic standards. Original work is required in this course to meet its learning objectives. Work produced by Generative AI is not original work and will not aid in the learning process for this course. Law school instructors and administrators reserve the right to use AI detection software to find instance of AI in student submissions.

Professionalism and Expectations

You are entering the final stretch of law school, and this course should be approached with a high level of professionalism. Preparation, participation, and respect are expected at all times. This means completing all pre-class work, engaging actively in class discussions and exercises, and conducting yourself in a courteous, professional manner with your classmates and instructor. All students must abide by Academic Standards and Academic Regulations in doing coursework – all work you submit (quizzes, essays, etc.) must be your own.

Remember that this course is designed to help you pass the bar exam and transition into practice. It will only be effective if you commit to it and take the assignments seriously. Treat each task as an opportunity to develop skills and knowledge that you will need on the bar exam. By keeping up with the work, attending class, and putting forth your best effort, you will not only earn credit for this class, but also set yourself up for success on the bar exam and your legal career.

Course Book

You will receive a course book containing outlines, initial learning questions, and other materials.

Reading and Homework Assignments

You are expected to complete the reading and homework assignments prior to each class. This will include uploading completed assignments to the D2L platform. You may be given additional assignments during class.
