Course Overview:

This course focuses on the legal and practical aspects of conducting and defending against a federal criminal investigation. Specifically, this seminar examines the work of prosecutors and defense attorneys applying the constitutional, statutory, ethical and other rules that govern the federal criminal process from conducting the investigation through the decision to charge, as well as the process involved with guilty pleas, trials, and sentencing hearings. We will discuss the relevant rules, as well as contextualize this body of law, describing the real-world process of prosecuting and defending those accused of crime, proving facts, and the skills involved in applying the law to the facts. We will use materials from a textbook, as well as supplemental materials relevant

to the various topics that we will cover. We will also have a variety of guest speakers attend some of the sessions to discuss their areas of investigative experience and focus.

Course Learning Outcomes:

By the end of the course, students will be able to demonstrate an understanding of:

- (1) the laws governing federal criminal investigations;
- (2) common issues arising in federal criminal investigations; and
- (3) the law enforcement tools available to investigators and prosecutors.

Grading Policies:

Participation %: 20. This includes various opportunities to discuss the investigative process and real-life scenarios and cases relevant to the topic at hand.

Additional Content %: 80 Final Paper. This writing assignment (10- to 15-pages) will involve a deep dive into one criminal docket, including analyzing investigative techniques, charging decisions, and defense challenges to the prosecution's case.
