The course materials will be available to students in a course packet consisting of publicly available materials which do not require the students to incur cost to review.

Course Overview:

This course provides an in-depth examination of the role and value of ethics and compliance functions within organizations. The course will focus on the pillars of a compliance program and analyze how these elements fall within the context of international and domestic legislation. Special emphasis will be placed on key statutes such as the US Anti-Kickback Statute, False Claims Act, Stark Law, The Foreign Corrupt Practices Act and the UK Bribery Act, providing students with an understanding of the regulatory landscape and key compliance risk areas for companies operating both domestically and internationally.

Course Learning Outcomes:

A student who completes this course will demonstrate:

- an understanding of key elements of the legal regimes and government agency expectations that are pertinent to modern day Ethics and Compliance practitioners
- an understanding of the differences and interrelationships between Compliance and Legal
- an understanding of internal controls frameworks
- knowledge of the essential elements of an effective Compliance program

Grading Policies:

A grade of 80% or more will be required to pass this class. Students will be graded on two major components; submission of a "Compliance Hot Topic" paper of publishable quality (600-800 words, not including footnotes) and class participation in equal parts.

- WRITING ASSIGNMENTS: Students will complete a final paper that will be due by midnight PST on 18 January 2026. In the paper, students will identify and analyze a discrete issue, incorporating a clear thesis. The writing assignment will count for 50% of the course grade.
- CLASS PARTICIPATION: In this course, students should come to class prepared to participate in class discussion, having critically analyzed the readings. Class participation will count for 50% of the final grade.

Classroom Policies:

Attendance: Per AR 3-1.4, "maintenance of matriculation requires regular class preparation, participation and attendance, registration in the course of study required for the student's program (full-time or part-time), successive registration for each fall and

spring term of each academic year until study is completed, and compliance with all other relevant requirements."

Regular attendance by way of being visible in class on camera is expected, and participation is required to achieve a passing grade.

Absences: Per AR 4-1.1, "if a student is absent for any reason for more than 20 percent of the sessions of a course, the student is not eligible for credit in that course. A student who is not present for at least 75 percent of a session of the course is absent from that session."

Participation & Preparation:

Class attendance and interactivity will make up half of the grade. Class attendance is expected and required, with persistent unexcused absences subjecting students to a downward grade adjustment. In addition, each student may be requested to participate in helping lead a portion of a class. Guest speakers may also be invited to participate in the class. Attendance with cameras on for the duration of the classes is expected.

- Students are expected to complete pre-read assignments and be prepared to discuss.
- Each student (either individually or as part of a group) will be required to lead a compliance case student class discussion).
- Academic Integrity: All work submitted must be your own. Plagiarism or any form of academic dishonesty, including use of artificial intelligence will not be tolerated.
